Construction Update - Week of May 4, 2015

We are entering the third week of construction for the Flamingo Corridor Improvements project. Please see construction updates below.

Howard Hughes Parkway to Paradise Road

Ongoing sewer work will continue with 24-hour traffic control restrictions. From 9 p.m. - 5 a.m. Sunday through Thursday, travel lanes will be restricted to one lane eastbound during night work. Two travel lanes will be open during non-work hours.

Temporary bus stops and/or delays associated with these lane closures that may impact stops in this area.

Grand Canyon Drive to Rainbow Boulevard

Ongoing median work will have lane closures both East and West bound during nighttime and daytime hours. Two travel lanes will be open during this work, which will be in effect until May 10.

Beginning May 11, work will move from the medians to the outside shoulders for bus stop construction activities. Eastbound lanes will be restricted to a single travel lane from Grand Canyon to Buffalo 24 hours a day. This work will continue for approximately four weeks.

Temporary bus stops and/or delays associated with these lane closures that may impact stops in this area.

Transit Route 202 Detours / Shuttle Service

Due to the long-term construction project on Flamingo Road east of Boulder Highway and resulting delays, route 202 will be shortened and a shuttle will cover the service lost by the shortened route. This change went into effect April 24 and will continue for approximately three months.
